Summary of presentation:

In this workshop the role of exercise prescription and dosage in the rehabilitation of swallowing disorders is discussed. The workshop will focus on different approaches that are needed for some patients and why isolated exercises in swallowing rehabilitation for some patients work and how using the principles of exercise physiology might help to train dysphagia patients more efficient and more effective.

Speaker biography:

Dr Hans Bogaardt is a speech pathologist and clinical epidemiologist who works as a Senior Lecturer in Speech Pathology at the University of Adelaide in Australia. His research focuses on the rehabilitation of swallowing disorders with a strong focus on the use of biofeedback and electrical stimulation as supportive methods in the treatment of swallowing disorders. His work in this area has been cited many times and Hans has led workshops on the treatment of swallowing disorders around the world in the last decades. Next to his research into swallowing disorders, Hans has a strong interest in the management of communication disorders in Multiple Sclerosis. Ongoing research projects see Hans collaborate with researchers from around the world and has visited many countries in his career. Hans has (co-) authored over 80 academic articles, books and book chapters, and has mentored several national and international PhD-students.
